Sometimes the legislation suggested can be illogical or really drive up costs, drastically effecting what happens in the industry."

The Homestead Welcome Center project was finished nearly two months ahead of schedule. Because the weather is delaying landscaping, the grand opening will be announced at a later date.

A new single-story structure was built to replace the existing rest area. The building includes: restrooms, a family restroom, storage space, welcome center/exhibit space and mechanical room. The sidewalks, parking space, picnic areas, and exterior lighting were also renovated. Four and a half miles of new rural water line was put in to provide adequate water supply to the rest area.

The pre-cast tipi structure was a part of the original site. The concrete pad below it was re-poured and new lighting was added to illuminate the sculpture. There are nine landmark tipis on Interstate 90 in South Dakota.

Women's Empowering Life Line (WELL) Project, Norfolk, NE

Beckenhauer Construction, Inc. worked with Women's Empowering Life Line (WELL) to renovate the old Nebraska Christian College in Norfolk. This building began as a one-story chapel and was being used as a storage and meeting space. Beckenhauer Construction renovated the space, providing two levels of office, support and counseling space to accommodate WELL functions. The new two-story area includes two family visitation rooms, one bathroom, six staff offices, and two group meeting spaces.

Structural elements included a slab on metal deck with truss supports. The deck is set on the existing masonry brick along the sides and a new bearing masonry wall in the center. New footings were poured to support the new bearing wall. In order for the building to meet city efficiency requirements, all existing masonry

walls were insulated with rigid foam and have drywall framed walls built in front of that. Insulation was also installed above the ceiling tile on the second floor for temperature control and energy code adherence.
